The Ed & Cynthia Shaw Memorial Birdathon 2018

This year's JAS Birdathon is dedicated to the memory of our friends Ed and Cynthia Shaw. Cynthia was a founding member of the Jayhawk Audubon Society, and both were actively engaged in Kaw Valley Eagles Day. From the outset, Cynthia and Ed hosted Eagles Day planning meetings with spectacular hospitality welcoming us with wonderful homemade desserts and creative cocktails making the meetings a pleasure instead of work. They always pitched in on special tasks to make Eagles Day a huge success. Sadly, Ed passed away this past May, and Cynthia in December. They are greatly missed by all in the Society.

Birdathon, held the first full weekend in May, raises money for JAS public education events and initiatives such as Eagles Day, free Monarch Tagging, the Learning About Nature Project, Museum Camp scholarships, and special out-of-town speakers, such as author J. Drew Lanham in May (See p. 5).

Like any other "thon" the idea is to collect or make pledges to sponsor individuals birders or teams who search out as many species as they can during the Birdathon. Many sponsors pledge a certain amount—say 25, 35, or 50 cents—per species sighted. With migratory songbirds moving through in May, the number of species identified in past years has been well over 150. Some years bring something unusual such as the Black-bellied Whistling-Duck sighted at the Baker Wetlands in 2008, but every year brings the thrill of favorite warblers, shorebirds, and hummingbirds.

Whether you're an accomplished birder looking for a good opportunity to get out for a good cause, or a beginner looking to join a team to improve your birding skills, Birdathon is perfect. Monday, April 23rd Prairie Passerines & Woodland Wonders: Songbirds in Springtime

Spring migration brings with it the joy of renewing old friendships, the rush of first-of-the-year sightings, and the effervescence of a constantly changing cast of characters. In our fast-paced, frenetic world of electronic stimulation, the spring migration forces us to slow down and take a closer look. Perhaps we want to bask in the sweet songs and brilliant colors of the testosterone-laden males, maybe we need to linger to identity the subtle and inconspicuous females among more dense and fresh foliage, or it could be that we are simply rusty in recognizing these transient visitors. In April's talk, we will revisit some spring beauties and consider some tricks we might employ to make the most of this bounty before settling down into the slower-paced, sultry days of summer.



Scott Kimball, our April speaker, is an avian behavioral ecologist, with a specialization in mating system dynamics in birds. Currently assistant professor of Biology at Baker, he also spent over 4 years as an assistant professor of Biology at the State University of New York, Morrisville. Dr. Kimball earned his BA in Biology from Baker, his MS in Raptor Biology from Boise State and his PhD in Evolution, Ecology, and Organismal Biology from Ohio State. His academic career has afforded him intimate access to work and play in the wild forests and waters of the northern tier of the US, including the Intermountain West, the Great Lakes, and the Northeast. An enthusiast of natural history, Dr. Kimball loves to share time outdoors with his students and his family, especially his wife, Jennifer, and son, Finch. 

SHARE THE TRAIL! Blue Bird Group Seeks New Monitors & Box Builders

The Kaw Valley Blue Bird Association needs bluebird enthusiasts to help with monitoring the trails at Clinton and Perry Lakes. It's a fascinating way to spend an hour or a morning. Checking boxes is like opening one surprise package after another! Of course the surprise can be that the box is empty...but satisfyingly often there is a nest with eggs or even a bluebird parent incubating those eggs and bravely sitting tight even when you open the box and peer in. That's exciting!

To help you decide if this is something you would enjoy, we're holding some "Share the Trail" events where you'll have a chance to join a trail monitor as they check boxes. You'll learn the best way to approach the boxes and share in the close-up encounters with these gorgeous, useful birds—they eat so many insects! We hope to have a "Share the Trail" schedule ready for the May JAS newsletter. The egg-laying and hatching action will be in full swing by then.

KVBBA also needs volunteers to build bluebird boxes. We have detailed plans (developed by club member Gene Van Hoesen) for you to follow; the club will pay for all materials. Your contribution will be your time and woodworking skills.

Sparrow Swap sent a request for help from JAS members to Jennifer Dropkin, our FB Administrator

"North Carolina Museum of Natural Sciences is carrying out a house sparrow egg study called The Sparrow Swap. We are asking people to send us house sparrow eggs removed from bluebird nest boxes. We are studying these eggs for contaminants that may accumulate in them from pollutants that persist in the environment, but also looking at the effectiveness of a couple of strategies for reducing house sparrow competition for nesting sites that bluebirds rely on.

Save the Date to Hear Dr. J. Drew Lanham Speak on Range-Mapping: Connecting the Conservation Dots for the Human Animal

Thursday, May 24, 7-8:30 pm at Liberty Hall

Dr. J. Drew Lanham is a native of Edgefield, S.C. A conservation ornithologist, naturalist and hunter-conservationist, Drew is also an Alumni Distinguished Professor and Alumni Master Teacher at Clemson University. He is intrigued with how cultural and ethnic prisms can bend perceptions of nature and its care, and is a speaker who eloquently connects birds, race and conservation ethics.

He is the author of *The Home Place: Memoirs of a Colored Man's Love Affair with Nature* (Milkweed Editions, Minneapolis MN) and *Sparrow Envy*, a book of poetry (Holocene Press, Spartanburg, SC). *The Home Place* was named a 2017 Nature Book of Uncommon Merit, the first time in the Burroughs Association history such a designation was awarded. *The Home Place* was also recently named the 2018 winner of the Southern Environmental Law Center's Reed Environmental Writing Award. Dr. Lanham will inspire a discussion about how diverse communities relate to wildlife and other conservation issues.
